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Who is SEPA?

- Scotland's "environmental watchdog"
- Protect and improve the environment through regulation and monitoring
- Flood warning system for Scotland
- 22 offices across Scotland
- 1300 employees





Is it waste?

- Exclusion from the Waste Framework Directive:
 - natural, non-hazardous agricultural or forestry material
 - used in farming, forestry or for the production of energy from such biomass
 - through processes or methods which do not harm the environment or endanger human health



If it is waste...

- Register an exemption
 - Paragraph 7 for the spreading of plant tissue waste
 - Agricultural land or forests, woodlands, parks, gardens, sports grounds, etc.
 - Benefit to agriculture/ ecological improvement
- Comply with the relevant objectives
 - Not endangering human health or harming the environment
 - Not causing risk to water, air, soil, plants or animals
 - Not causing odour or noise nuisance



Biochar Position

- Manufacture of Biochar from Waste
 - Restrictions on the equipment
 - Limits on tonnage
 - Restrictions on waste types
- Use of Waste Derived Biochar
 - Under a paragraph 7 exemption
 - Used on specified land
 - For benefit to agriculture or ecological improvement
